Regarding the review of the premises license of The Challenge Arms pub, 23 Eskdalli Street, Kettering, NN16 8RA, I am writing to strongly object to the pub and explain how they continually fail to prevent public nuisance.

My family and I live directly opposite the pub and its car park and over the past few months, we have experienced intolerable levels of noise causing disruption, stress, and anxiety. We regularly call the police to complain of anti-social behaviour taking place in the pub's car park, and we also regularly call the council's out of hours number to complain about loud music. The situation has escalated to the point where my wife, faced with a lack of sleep every weekend, has moved out at the weekends in an attempt to get some sleep. Our main concern though is the effect that this has had on my seven month old daughter, who has disrupted sleep every weekend, waking to loud music, loud swearing, and even violence outside from the Challenge Arms. We are incredibly worried about the long term effects this will have on her development. I bought my house in 2005, when the pub was known as The Beez Neez, a quiet restaurant/bar. Since The Challenge Arms has opened, it has clearly tried to operate as more of a town centre style bar, often resembling a nightclub at times, despite being in a residential street surrounded by houses. I wanted my house to be a nice home for my family, but The Challenge Arms has not made this possible.

There are three main problems:

- 1) Music. Over the past few months, the pub has played music at excessive volume every Thursday, Friday, and Saturday night. The loud bass thumps throughout my entire house, a constant drumming beat making sleep impossible, until the pub closes at 11pm on Thursdays and midnight on Fridays/Saturdays. The music is so loud that it can be heard above the television. The thumping dance music, what I would describe as "nightclub music", often wakes my daughter and prevents my wife and I from sleeping. On Thursdays, they have a karaoke night and we then have to endure singing as well. We can hear the DJ using the microphone from inside my house. After many complaints to the council, the pub was served with a Noise Abatement Notice. Despite this, the music volume has been louder than at any time since the pub opened.
- 2) Car Park. Even when music is not being played, my family and I are subjected to a great deal of noise and anti social behaviour coming from the car park. The pub does not have a beer garden, instead they let customers take their drinks outside into the car park which they share with three or four neighbouring businesses. At times, there have been groups of 30-40 people congregating in the car park opposite my house, drinking and shouting. We are subjected to loud swearing, smashing bottles and glasses, and there are often fights. The pub does not have any door staff and the car park is not monitored by any pub staff, so customers are left to their own devices. On the times when pub staff are present, they are

often just drinking with their customers and do nothing to keep them quiet or maintain order. The car park is not an enclosed beer garden, and people are free to come and go as they please, which leads to people leaving the pub with their drinks. Customers often treat the pub like an off licence, with people buying drinks from the pub then walking down Eskdaill Street with pints and bottles in their hands. I do not understand why pubs in the town centre restrict customers from taking their drinks outside but The Challenge Arms does not, despite being in a residential area.

3) Children. The pub lets customers bring young children with them, but this again is not monitored in any way. My wife and I are deeply concerned about this, as children are often left to entertain themselves in the car park next to a busy main road while their parents drink alcohol, sometimes long into the evening. We can often hear babies crying as late as 10pm and my wife raised her concerns with the NSPCC. Again, I do not understand why other town centre pubs do not allow children, yet The Chailenge Arms does.

Thanks for taking the time to read my concerns. I have enclosed a chronology of events, including some of the times we have called the council's out of hours service and police. Please keep me informed of any developments regarding the licence review.

Whilst on the phone Mrs Wallis looks out of the window and observes there to be several groups of people in the car park shouting, using offensive language and all having drinks in their hands. No one is seen to ask the people to be quiet. 10pm Mrs Wallis hears loud bass music in the bedroom and observes a group |

She looks out of the window and observes there to be a group of five people standing nearer the pub's gated entrance on the pavement of Eskdaili Street, holding drinks from the pub and shouting very loudly. No pub staff are present and the customers are free to leave the pub premises with drinks and make as much noise as they want, therefore a call is made to the out of hours service due to anti social behaviour and music. |
| 04.04.13 | Mrs Wallis experiences feelings of anxiety about the evening due to it being a Thursday (symptoms are upset stomach, restlessness and a headache). |
| 05.04.13 | Advised of new owner at the pub, Ms Katherine Harper, who was known to already work there due to her attending the licence hearing for an extension of opening hours on 30 th October 2012. |
| | Mrs Wallis hears loud bass music in the bathroom at 9.40pm. On coming downstairs the family dog is barking and very restless so Mrs Wallis looks out the window and observes a large group of young people shouting in the car park. Mrs Wallis contacts the out of hours service. |
| | At 10.30 Mrs Wallis attempts to go to bed but on entering her bedroom she hears loud bass music. She also observes a group of fifteen people in the car park shouting and using offensive language. Mrs Wallis calls the out of hours service. At 10.40pm the noise level increases and the behaviour of the group becomes aggressive so she again calls the out of hours service. Whilst on the phone Mrs Wallis observes two males arguing and pushing one another. The men and a woman walk behind the pub out of sight, towards the next door garage. Mrs Wallis therefore contacts the police (678 05042013). Police attend five minutes later where there are a number of young people at the doors of the pub shouting and laughing. |
| | During the observations the people in the car park are observed to have glass bottles and pints in their hands. At no time are the customers seen to be asked to keep the noise down by staff. |
